GENERAL RULES AND
REGULATIONS

1. Flowers must be in place by 8 PM, Tuesday.

2. All entries must be in place before judging begins.

3. Late entries cannot be considered.

4. Two or fewer entries in any variety of potted plants, cut-flowers, or arrangement are considered "no competition" and a first premium will be given ONLY if entry exhibits real merit. Generally, second premium will be the high award in such cases.

5. To make cut flowers and arrangements last longer, they should be cut at least 12 hours prior to use and conditioned as follows: Make a fresh cut of the stem and remove foliage below water line. Place flowers into a container of "warm" water to which a small amount of sugar (one tablespoon per gallon) has been added.

6. Commercial gardeners are deemed to be those persons who raise flowers for sale either wholesale or retail primarily as gainful occupation or grow or have grown for them flowers to be used in any manner whatsoever in the pursuit of a gainful occupation or who are engaged in the occupation of growing flowers as an agent or employee for a person, firm or corporation. Persons making casual sales of home grown plants or flowers are excepted from this category.

7. All varieties of plants or flowers exhibited for premiums must have the species name legibly and correctly written on entry tag.

8. Plants in pots entered for prizes must show skillful culture in the profusion of bloom and symmetry and vigor of specimens.

ONE ENTRY PER CLASS.

Section 1. Potted Plants

All recognized varieties can be entered but must be grown by exhibitor and correctly named on entry tag. Points considered in judging: Shape, distinctiveness,

perfection for growth or foliage and bloom. Any plant found to be harboring insects or showing signs of any virus, disease, or scale will be disqualified and removed from exhibition immediately.

Not open to professional florists. Plants must have been grown by exhibitor.

Section 2. *Specimens of Annual Cut Flowers*

All recognized varieties are eligible but must be **correctly named** on entry tag. Three specimens or three stems constitute an entry. Points considered in judging cut flowers are: uniform specimens, color, size, stem, scent. An exhibitor may not enter more than one exhibit in each class. List each variety numerically by class. No foliage should appear below container neck or water line. Place specimens in a clear glass container of appropriate size. Not open to commercial gardeners. Flowers must have been grown by exhibitor. Dead blooms will be disposed of. All specimens must have three (3) stems of the same variety, tied loosely together with string or raffia.

GRANGE EXHIBITS**

It is the wish of the Board of Directors that every Grange in the Northern Region of Vermont and New Hampshire exhibit at the Lancaster Fair. With the hope for

greater participation by all of the areas Grange Organizations, we modified the Grange Exhibition areas for the 2007 Lancaster Fair.

This year each participating Grange will be allotted a 4'X4'X4' floor to ceiling space. Each Grange may exhibit any hand made objects, home produced products and home grown vegetables and flowers, displayed as they choose, within the allotted space. All items must be made or grown by a Granger. The Theme of the 2008 Grange Exhibit will be "AGRICULTURE AND PROGRESS". These three words MUST appear within the exhibit, but may be rearranged or added to in any way the Grange chooses.

Also required in every exhibit will be: an American flag, the Grange symbol, and at least three photographs of Grangers at work within their respective Community. Each exhibit should identify the location to that Grange. (Example: Riverside Grange—Dalton, NH)

The exhibits will be judged upon the following criteria:

1. Effective use of the Theme—30 pts.
2. Organization and overall effectiveness of the exhibit—15 pts.
3. "Stopping Power" of the exhibit—10 pts.
4. Does the exhibit show that the Grange is working within it's Community—20 pts.
5. Quality of the individual items exhibited—25 pts.

TOTAL POSSIBLE POINTS: 100

Prizes will be awarded based upon the following point scores:

- 1st-95pts or greater—\$150.00
- 2nd-85pts-94pts—\$125.00
- 3rd-70pts-84pts—\$100.00

Each Grange exhibit will be scored individually and the ribbon and prize moneys will be awarded according to point score.

NOTE: All exhibitors are
